"Welcome to the first edition of the Berkshire Teaching School Alliance newsletter! The Teaching School has had a successful year, despite the challenges of Covid-19. We have recruited a high calibre of school direct trainees and continue working in partnership with the University of Reading to provide professional teacher training courses. The lead school for Berkshire Teaching School Alliance, Maiden Erlegh School, was visited by Ofsted just before the lockdown and judged the school to be outstanding in all categories. The school was also part of Reading

University's involvement in the Ofsted Initial Teacher Training (ITT) Inspection Pilot and the feedback received was very positive. The Teaching School has recruited over 40 Specialist Leaders in Education. They, alongside our two National Leaders of Education, work on school-to-school improvement and professional development within and outside of Maiden Erlegh Trust. The Trust also has four Fellows of the Chartered College of Teaching. Finally, we are excited to announce that Heathermount School, a special school joined Berkshire TSA in September 2020, taking our Alliance partners to 15 schools."

Title: Head of Science / Specialist Leader in Education

School: Maiden Erlegh School

Quote from the staff member:

"Less is more"



Every issue we quiz one of our BTSA colleagues!

What is your role? Head of Science at Maiden Erlegh school. I lead a large science Faculty, with 24 teaching staff and 5 technical support staff. We have a large number of students who go on to study the sciences at A level. I oversee the science heads of department/ subject leads and develop the vision for the faculty. I organise curriculum development and support with the professional development of my team by delivering CPD.

What do you find most rewarding about your role? Ultimately

my time in the classroom with the students. I find the moments in a lesson when a student who was struggling suddenly has that light bulb moment particularly rewarding. Additionally in my SLE role, I have completed some long term projects doing outreach work with a range of different schools. It has been especially fulfilling when you see first hand the improvements at the school which are then also recognised by external verifiers such a Ofsted.

Who inspired you to pursue the career you have today? To be honest, teaching was never on my radar and I was heading down a very different career path, however when I did begin to contemplate teaching as a career, my grandmother was a big inspiration as she had been a teacher and lecturer at university.

What challenges did you initially face when you became a teacher? Initially my focus was very much about what I was doing in the classroom. As you gain in experience you realise that your focus changes and it is all about what the students are doing and how you can facilitate their learning and understanding of the concepts you are teaching.

What advice would you give to a trainee teacher? Be organised! Try to stay ahead in terms of lesson planning and prepping resources. I tend to ensure I have my materials ready a week in advance and it really does help when you have to deal with the unexpected.

What inspires you? My colleagues. It has been a difficult few months for us all recently in adjusting to life and teaching in the midst of a global pandemic. We are a strong team and have worked together to support each other and develop an enormous range of new skills.

Recommend a book you recently read I am Pilgrim by Terry Hayes. Nothing to do with education but I found it rather gripping.

What is your secret talent that no one knows about? I am ambidextrous, which really helps when using more than I colour to write on the whiteboard!

NQT SPOTLIGHT

The 2019—2020 cohort of trainee teachers completed their training in unique circumstances this year. This cohort have demonstrated flexibility and resilience in the unique circumstances caused by the Covid outbreak. They have skills and experience that will be invaluable to schools as they have become newly qualified teachers (NQTs). Our NQT programme supports NQTS by providing tailored support and professional development to each individual. Current NQT Elysia is enjoying the programme,

"I am absolutely loving my first term at Maiden Erlegh as an NQT. It's been a very unusual first term, but busy none the less (I'm not quite sure where the last few months have gone!).

My fellow NQT colleagues and I have all been assigned a tutor group, which has been a great way to build a pastoral rapport with students. We have had half-termly observations and meetings with our mentors, and received constructive feedback each time, as well as receiving lots of guidance from departments. Despite it not being ideal, the opportunity to teach online lessons has also been a great learning experience.

We have also engaged in a variety of NQT conferences, some within the Maiden Erlegh Trust, and others extended to the Wokingham Borough. These conferences have covered behaviour management, supporting SEND, teaching & learning, and the use of data. Whilst it has been a shame that we have not been able to meet up with other NQT's in person, it has still been great to share experiences and pick up tips for the year ahead. Thank you to the members of staff within the school and Trust who have delivered these sessions, we're all looking forward to the conferences in the new year.

Become a Youth Mental Health First Aider

2 Day Course

The Youth Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) course is for everyone who works with, lives with or supports young people aged 8-18. They will teach you the skills and confidence to spot the signs of mental health issues in a young person, offer first aid and guide them towards the support they need. In doing so, you can speed up a young person's recovery and stop a mental health issue from getting worse.

The course will teach you to listen, reassure and respond, even in a crisis and even potentially stop a crisis from happening.

But more than that, we aim to give you the information and skills to look after your own mental health so that you can set an example for young people. By giving you the tools to have these conversations, we hope to empower you to create a mentally healthy, supportive environment in your family, school, peer group or community.

Let's create a future where mental health is treated as a normal part of life, in the same way as physical health. A future where every young person has access to support if they need it.

This course qualifies you as a Youth Mental Health First Aider, giving you:

- An in-depth understanding of young people's mental health and factors that affect wellbeing
- Practical skills to spot the triggers and signs of mental health issues
- Confidence to reassure and support a young person in distress
- Enhanced interpersonal skills such as nonjudgemental listening
- Knowledge to help a young person recover their health by guiding them to further support – whether that's through self-help sites, their place of learning, the NHS, or a mix – engaging with parents, carers and external agencies where appropriate
- Ability to support a young person with a long term mental health issue or disability to thrive
- Tools to look after your own mental wellbeing

Everyone who completes the course gets:

A certificate of attendance to say you are a Youth Mental Health First Aider

A Youth MHFA manual to refer to whenever you need it

A workbook including some helpful tools to support your own mental health
